Topical Issues

Like other group leaders, I hoped that Covid-9 restrictions last year would be lifted by summer to allow us to restart at the HTPC classroom. As summer changed to autumn, it became clear we would have to think again. I started to use Zoom with a few friends in Probus and tried it for Topical Issues. It was basically fine - but the time limit of 40 minutes was nowhere near enough for our vociferous members.

I decided to upgrade to the "standard" Zoom licence which removed the time limit and had other functions such as polling and screen sharing. Zoom has helped Topical Issues group develop beyond our old monthly meeting in person.

We now meet weekly by Zoom at the same regular time: 9.30 am every Thursday. I send out invitations the day before with some suggestions for topics and attach any documents or links for discussion. Zoom allows us to take topics from members during the meeting and share documents or web pages as well as have impromptu polls with various questions. The number of people attending has grown and added to the experience we share.

I hope that when HTPC reopens to still have our monthly meeting in person for those who do not like Zoom, but continue the weekly sessions for those that do. At least some good has come out of lockdown!

Recent topics have included:

- The Scottish referendum: should voters outside Scotland have a say?
- Dorset Council survey on Climate Change Emergency Response: do we agree or not?
- Covid vaccinations : what should priorities be?
- Brexit: will there ever be a deal?
- Donald Trump: is it happening here? (concentration of power in one person and their unelected advisors)
- Climate change: is it real?

We always have a lively discussion, partly because some may take an opposite view just to test your resolve.


Member Participation Survey

The committee wanted to understand how members make use of Dorchester u3a in order to make better decisions.

The analysis is based on the 2019-20 members list, monthly meeting records and group attendance sheets. The results below are for Dorchester members only. At the time of the survey, we had 926 members and usable information for 59 groups.

Group Membership Analysis

Here, membership of a group is taken to be having attended once or more. No distinction is made on how often a member attends.



How many Groups


Both the table (right) and the chart (above) show how many Dorchester u3a members are active in how many groups.

For example 261 members did not attend any groups, while 1 person attended 11 groups.

537 members did not attend any monthly meeting. 130 attended one and 259 attended more than one (pie chart right).




Combined Monthly and Group Meeting Analysis

Being Chairman

But most of all, they **must** be the team leader and figurehead for our u3a. They need to keep in touch with members, Group Leaders, and helpers to ensure that things run smoothly and continually look for ways to improve the service to our members.

Geology

Our meetings have continued using Zoom and have been well-attended. We closed out the year with a talk called 'Dorset Ripples'. This is a reference to the folding and faulting which took place about 25 million years ago. Europe got the Alps, while the rocks in Dorset were mostly folded more gently. In the Dorchester area we sit in a gentle downfold, the Frome syncline. In other areas, the rocks formed tight folds, as seen in the picture of the 'Lulworth Crumple'.

Moving forward in geological time, the January meeting looked at what we call the Quaternary, or 'Ice Age'. In fact, there were 20 cold and warm cycles over a 2-million-year period. Remains of hippos found in gravels below Trafalgar Square reflect the warmer interglacials, one of which we are still in.

The next few meetings will cover some of the large mammals or 'megabeasts' which were around during the 'Ice Age', such as woolly mammoths and sabre-tooth cats. Most of these became extinct with the arrival of *Homo sapiens* in their habitats and as the ice melted. We'll also be looking at how glaciations affected the landscape of the British Isles including how Dorset was affected. Being further south, Dorset escaped any actual ice sheets but had a climate in the cold cycles similar to that of Siberia today. Sea levels went up and down too, with these climatic fluctuations.

I can still fit a few more on Zoom (!) so if you want to join the group do let me know.

Poetry Appreciation

During the first lockdown we started an email group discussion, taking it in turns to share a favourite poem. We always learn so much from each other and this opportunity to communicate via email was no exception. In the autumn we were lucky enough to have two actual meetings, albeit with reduced numbers as we had to comply with the rule of 6. In May's session, we had been due to study the poetry of the Second World War but Covid restrictions had put paid to that, as it did the planned national commemoration of VE Day. So instead, we used one of our physical meetings to explore poems written by those who had experienced the Second World War, either as soldiers or members of resistance groups. We normally read work by poets from the UK so it was really interesting to read poetry from a range of different nationalities, including Polish, German and Japanese. One of the poems we studied, 'Metamorphosis', appeared to have no link to war at all; it was written as a recruitment poem for the French resistance - legally published (written on a blackboard outside an art gallery) but cryptically subversive. We are now looking at one poem, once a month.

One of the poems that the group admired is called High Flight. It was written by John Gillespie Magee (an Anglo-American aviator and poet).

Oh! I have slipped the surly bonds of Earth
And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings;
Sunward I've climbed, and joined the tumbling mirth
Of sun-split clouds, — and done a hundred things
You have not dreamed of — wheeled and soared and swung
High in the sunlit silence. Hov'ring there,
I've chased the shouting wind along, and flung
My eager craft through footless halls of air...

Up, up the long, delirious burning blue I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace Where never lark, or ever eagle flew – And, while with silent, lifting mind I've trod The high untrespassed sanctity of space, Put out my hand, and touched the face of God.
